

DESCENDANTS OF JOHN PEDRICK OF THE NECK AND JOHN PEDRICK OF MARBLEHEAD, MASSACHUSETTS

1. JOHN<sup>1</sup> PEDRICK (of the Neck) was born about 1624, perhaps in Cornwall, England, and died between 2 August and 7 October 1686. He married MIRIAM \_\_\_\_\_, who was born about 1637 and who died in September 1717. She married, second, 4 December 1688, Richard Grosse, who died 11 September 1711, age 68 years.

In 1668 John "Pedricke" signed a petition from Marblehead for the repeal of customs duties (Mass. St. Archives, 60:39a).

One hundred and fourteen householders were listed in Marblehead in 1674. This list included John Pedrick Sr., probably the John "of the Neck," and John Pedrick Jr., probably the John "of the Main." (Samuel Roads, *The History and Traditions of Marblehead*, [Cambridge, 1880] p. 26.)

On 20 December 1678 Christopher Latimore sold to John Pedrick "of the neck" part of eight acres bought of John Goyte by "my father William Pitts." This land located on Marblehead neck was bordered by land that John Pedrick had lately bought of William Browne (Essex County Deeds, hereafter ECD, 5:37). John Codner of Marblehead testified on 16 October 1699 "Some of y<sup>e</sup> Chiefe proprietors in Marblehead went over to y<sup>e</sup> great Neck at Marblehead (So caled) and then & there Layd out unto John Petherick Sen<sup>r</sup> who was then a liver at Said Neck a parcell of land granted by y<sup>e</sup> Towne of Salem unto John Goit...being Eight acres...adjoyning to y<sup>e</sup> land where said John Petherick house stood...this was more Then Twenty yeares Since..." (ECD 13:161).

John wrote his will on 2 August 1686 and it was presented on 7 October 1686. He named his wife, Miriam; son-in-law John Stacey; son-in-law John Barrett; son-in-law Henry Brentnall; John Searle Jr. and his heirs; eldest son John; and eight other children: Benjamin, Agnes, Mary, Ann, Sarah, Miriam, Elizabeth, and Joanna (Suffolk Co. Probate #1498).

This estate was not completely settled for many years and in the probate file of his son, John, there are divisions of the real estate dated 19 February 1723/4 and 22 July 1727. There are ten shares: a double share to son John Pedrick and one share each to Agnes Stacey, Mary Searle, Ann Barrett, Sarah Brintnall, Miriam Lasher, Elizabeth Bull, Benjamin Pedrick, and Hannah Cook (Essex County Probate, hereafter ECP, #21088).

Miriam is buried on the Old Burial Hill and her stone reads:

The Mystery of John Pedrick's English Origins

Sir John Bourchier or Boucher (c. 1595 – August 1660) was an English parliamentarian, Puritan and one of the regicides of King Charles I.

Life [edit]

John Bourchier was the son of William Bourchier of Benningbrough and grandson of Sir Ralph Bourchier. He was probably educated at Christ's College, Cambridge, and was admitted to Gray's Inn in 1609/10. He was knighted in 1619.<sup>[1]</sup>

In 1625, Bourchier was appointed as a Justice of the Peace for the three Yorkshire Ridings. When Charles dissolved Parliament and sought to raise money through the forced loans in 1627, Sir John was one of those who refused. At the outbreak of the English Civil War, he was arrested and imprisoned in York until 1643. He was elected Member of Parliament for Ripon in 1647; at Pride's Purge, he was one of the MPs permitted to keep his seat in Commons.

As a judge at the trial of King Charles, he was one of the signatories of the King's death warrant. After the Restoration, May 1660, Bourchier was too ill to be tried as a regicide, and died, unrepentant, a few months later.

"During these contests between the two Houses, touching the exceptions to be made, Sir John Bourchier, who had been one of the King's judges, and had rendered himself within the time limit by the proclamation, being of a great age and very infirm, was permitted to lodge at a private house belonging to one of his daughters. In this place he was seized with so dangerous a fit of illness, that those about him who were his nearest relations, despairing of his recovery, and presuming that an acknowledgment from him of his sorrow, for the part he had in the condemnation of the King, might tend to procure some favour to them from those in power, they earnestly pressed him to give them that satisfaction. But he being highly displeased with their request, rose suddenly from his chair, which for some days he had not been able to do without assistance; and receiving fresh vigour from the memory of that action, said, 'I tell you, it was a just act. God and all good men will own it.' And having thus expressed himself, he sat down again, and soon after quietly ended his life."<sup>[2]</sup>

Bourchier was a great-grandson of Margaret Pole, 8th Countess of Salisbury who had been beheaded by order of King Henry VIII; Charles I was a great-great-grandson of Margaret Tudor-a sister of King Henry VIII. He was the great-great-great-grandson of Richard Neville, 16th Earl of Warwick, who was known as the "Kingmaker" for helping to place both Edward IV and Henry VI upon the throne during the War of the Roses.

Hurbert B Shoemaker, Genealogical and Biographical Record OF THE PEDRICK FAMILY OF NEW JERSEY 1675-1938 (PA): "The tradition in Marblehead regarding the assumption of name is in this wise. The first John Pedrick came of a branch of the family of the Earl of Sussex of which one had been in danger because he had sat in the . . . . . Chamber and voted for the execution of Charles I, and that he assumed the name of Pedrick to conceal his identity. The only Regicide who was of a family which had borne this title was a Boudrier, who had a son, John, as to both of whom there is no record of death or burial except in "Noble Regicides" that be, the father, "Sat down and died." So it may be that the first John in Marblehead was this son. His name and mark appears in a petition to the General Court in 1678 and it is claimed that this mark is in a form which suggests a "scrivener's skill" so that he possibly may have been the John Bourdrier who was educated at Oxford and at one time entered at Lincolns Inn Fields as a student at law. Credit is hereby extended to Hannah Tutt, Secretary of the Historical Society of Marblehead, who has generously supplied me with information."

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JOHN PEDERICK, senior, of Marblehead Neck. Will dated August 2, 1686. Peculiar mark to the will. Will probated October 7, 1686. Gives 1-4 acre each, to his sons in law, John Stasey, John Barrett, and Henry Brentnall, &c. Residue to his wife Miriam for life; after her death, a double share to his eldest son John, and the rest equally to the other 8 children, Benjamin, Agnes, Mary, Ann, Sarah, Miriam, Elizabeth and Johanna. Inventory includes 2 boats with their furniture and 2 mooring anchors, also one "black negro servant."—*Docket*, No. 1498.

Some speculate the mark may have something to do with his ancestry in England.

*John Pedrick Lot.* That part of this lot which lies easterly of the dashes was owned in 1672 by John Allen, who had probably purchased it of Mr. Lattimer. Mr. Allen sold it to Mr. William Brown, and Mr. Brown to John Pedrick in 1678. The remainder of the lot was conveyed by Mr. Lattimer, who was then called a vintner, to Mr. Petherick Dec. 20, 1678.† Mr. Pedrick owned the entire lot in 1700.

Lifting the Veil on Miriam Grose

Regarding the story by Nikki Gamer, "Conservator: Mysteries abound at memorial site" (Marblehead Reporter, May 20, 2010), I feel I must comment, at the risk of seeming like a 300-year-old wet blanket.

Mr. Ivan Myjer, who is identified as having been hired by the town of Marblehead to "conduct a site assessment of Old Burial Hill as a means of coming up with a preservation master plan," seems pretty mystified by the subject of his study. I think I can help lift the veil, or the shroud.



Regarding the old gravestone of Mrs. Miriam Grose, he mentions that it is "unique to find a stone that doesn't have a death date." Maybe so, but I might put it differently. The gravestone epitaph says that she died at the age of 80 leaving 180 living children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Obviously, her family felt that, in light of this profusion of life, death came in second — besides, they all knew when she died. They were on to something, since Mr. Myjer is fascinated by her stone precisely because it has no death date — Mrs. Grose's numerous family are still calling attention to her, three centuries later!

There really is no mystery, though, about her date of death: She died in September 1717, per the records of the First Congregational Church of Marblehead, as listed on page 568 of Marblehead Vital Records, Vol. II, published by the late lamented Essex Institute in 1904, a volume that is available seven days a week at Abbot Public Library. Her age-at-death is also listed, as 80, taken from the gravestone record at "Old Burial Hill cemetery" (per the Vital Records book; "Burial Hill" seems to be a neologism, since the old-timers called it "Burying" Hill, just as Salem's graveyard was, and is, Burying Point).

Who was this Mrs. Miriam Grose? In 1654 or so, Miriam, aged 17 (I don't know her family surname), married John Pedrick (1625?-1686), a 29-year-old fisherman who had settled in Marblehead by 1648. John was probably from Devon or Cornwall in the West of England, where the name Petherick (Pedrick) was not uncommon. In fact, there was another John Pedrick (c. 1638-c. 1706) living in Marblehead in the 1600s.

Miriam and John had at least nine children, the eldest being Agnes, born 1655, and the youngest Johannah, born 1680! They all survived to adulthood, and all had children except for son Benjamin (evidently).

In the 1670s, the John Pedrick family (two sons, seven daughters) moved to Marblehead Neck (no yacht clubs then; plenty of fish yards though) and settled on eight acres. Miriam was 49 when her husband died in 1686 (probably he was buried on his homestead), and late in 1688 she married Richard Grose, likely a widower, aged about 45. Her eldest daughter, Agnes, married John Stacey c. 1673 and had 11 children; her eldest son, John, married Mary Brown and had nine children, and others of her offspring were similarly prolific.

Miriam and Richard lived together for almost 23 years, until he died in September 1711, aged 68 (his gravestone is on the old hill). Six years later, Miriam died, too.

810 2. JOHN<sup>2</sup> PEDRICK (John<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1660 and died before 24 January 1728/9 when administration was granted on his estate. He married 10 January 1688/9, MARY BROWNE, who was alive in 1705. She was the daughter of William and Mary (?Chinn) Browne. 975

Richard Pedrick was appointed the administrator on his father's estate on 24 January 1728/9; the sureties were John Bailey and Nicholas Merritt. Evidently Richard died before completing the administration because on 7 April 1766 Joseph Pedrick was appointed the administrator with John Nutt and Nicholson Broughton as the sureties. An inventory was taken on 10 April 1767 and included two small pieces of land on the neck. (ECP #21088)

WILLIAM BROWN<sup>1</sup>, was a fisherman, and lived in Marblehead as early as 1664. He married Mary (Chinn?) before 1664; and died in the winter of 1683-4, his will, dated Nov. 7, 1683, being proved March 4, 1683-4. His estate was appraised at £221, 15. His mother was then deceased; and his wife probably survived him, and married, secondly, Richard Gross March 20, 1684.

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Sarah Brentnall, widow of Henry Brentnall, was appointed administratrix of his estate at Salem court, June 24, 1690. His mother was "Miriam Pedrick, now Gross."

Sarah Oliver of Marblehead was appointed administratrix of the estate of her son Henry Brentnall of Marblehead, fisherman, March 31, 1712.

The first David Oliver came to Georgetown from Boston to fish at Pemaquid. Around 1670 he married Grace Parker, granddaughter of John Parker the First. When David and Grace were living at Stage Island during the Indian raids between 1677 and 1679, Indians destroyed their home and about 60 others. They fled from the island and petitioned Sir Edmund Andros for land in the southern part of Arrowsic. David and the other settlers were granted land in Newtowne where they lived for 10 years or less. During this time the Indians had burned Newtowne. By 1680 King William's War was well under way and in 1703 it became Queen Anne's War, lasting through 1713. By this time the island was deserted as settlers fled from the area. David and Grace Oliver took refuge in Marblehead, Massachusetts. In May, David is listed as Capt. Rowden's Company of the Massachusetts Militia for service in the Indian Wars. David's two sons, Thomas and David Jr., both received land opposite Long Island in the Kennebec: Lot #4 in the division of the estate of their grandfather Thomas Parker, on land which is now Bay Point.

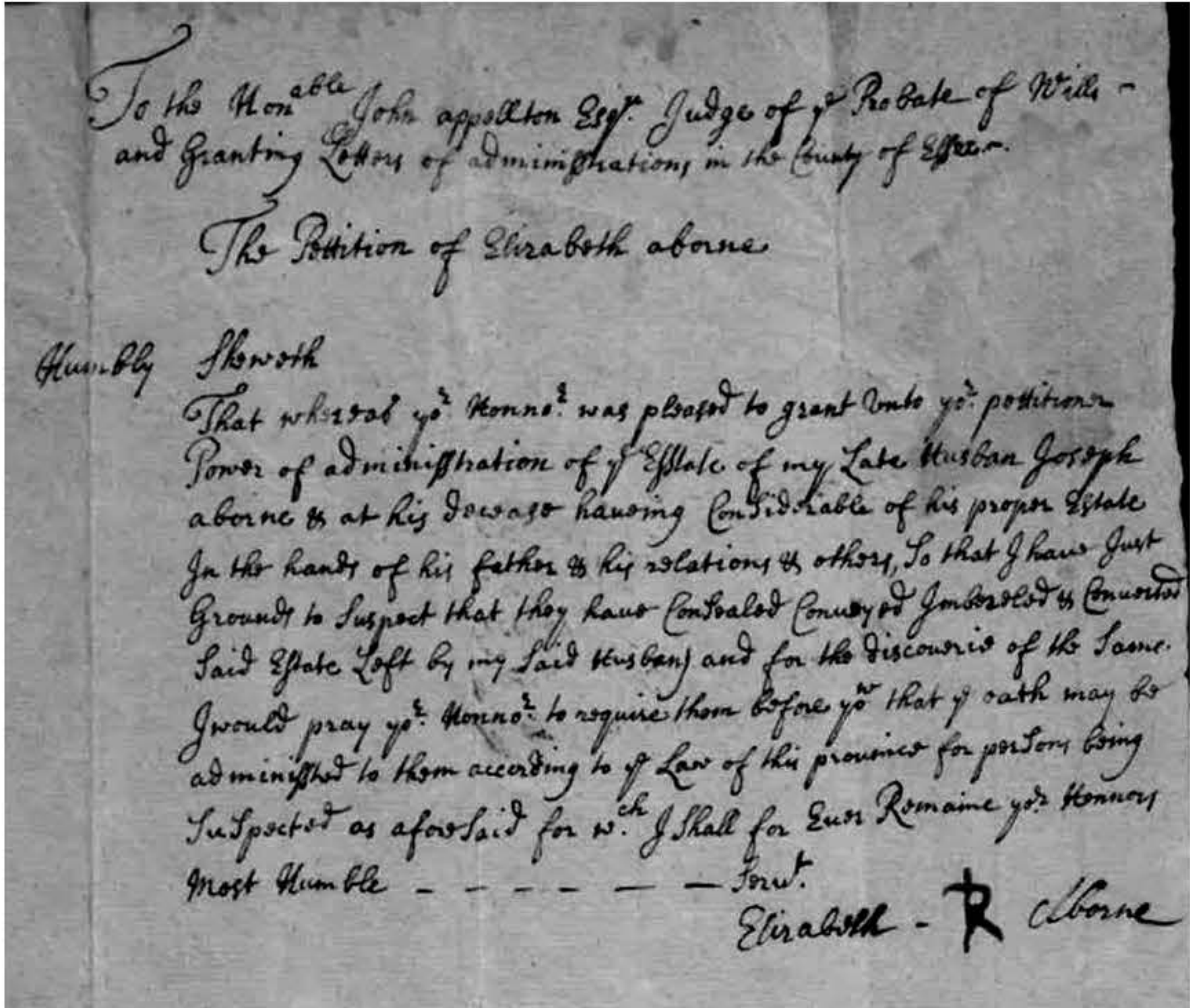

Estate of Samuel Waldron House. The northeastern part of this lot, within the dashes, was granted and laid out by the selectmen of Marblehead to James Stilson of Marblehead, cordwainer, Feb. 11, 1682-3 ;\* and on the same day that part lying south of the dashes was laid out by the selectmen to John Palmer.\* Mr. Stilson built a house and shop upon his part of the lot ; and, for forty pounds, conveyed the estate to Samuel Waldron of Marblehead, anchorsmith, Feb. 26, 1685-6.t Feb. 5, 1689-90, the trustees for the commoners of Marblehead conveyed to Mr. Waldron land on the western side of his lot westerly of the dashes, one-half of a rod wide and two rods and six feet in length.\* Mr. Waldron died possessed of the lot Dec. 8, 1691, at the age of thirty-four. The buildings and land were then appraised at forty-six pounds. The real estate was devised by Mr. Waldron's will to his wife Miriam and her child, which she was then carrying. If she died without children, then it was to go to his brothers and sisters, Rebecca Stevens, John Waldron, Joseph Waldron, Thomas Waldron, Sarah Waldron and Joanna Waldron. The widow, Miriam Waldron, married, second, Benjamin Henley April 12, 1694 ; and he probably died about 1702. She married, third, Abraham Lasher Sept. 29, 1704. How much longer the house stood is not known. The southern portion of the lot had come into the possession of Samuel Waldron apparently some time before his death, and was afterwards identified with that estate.

DESCENDANTS OF JOHN PEDRICK OF THE NECK AND JOHN PEDRICK OF MARBLEHEAD,  
MASSACHUSETTS

There were two John Pedricks in 17th century Marblehead. They were often distinguished by one being called "of the Neck" and the other "of the Main." While researching the ancestry of Karen Wood of Peabody, Massachusetts, I could not easily determine the ancestry of a William Pedrick who married Lois Devereux. It turns out that there is neither a birth nor a baptismal record for William, but a series of deeds in the early 1800s do prove his parentage. I decided then to undertake a larger study of the descendants of the two John Pedricks of Marblehead and I thank Ms. Wood for her permission to publish the research I did for her.

The Marblehead Historical Society has a very nice vertical file collection on early Marblehead families and I am grateful for their permission to publish some material which is unique to their collection.

Unless otherwise specified, all places are in Massachusetts and since almost all of the births, marriages, and deaths took place in Marblehead, all events without a specified place are from the published Marblehead vital records.

1. JOHN<sup>1</sup> PEDRICK (of the Neck) was born about 1624, perhaps in Cornwall, England, and died between 2 August and 7 October 1686. He married MIRIAM \_\_\_\_\_, who was born about 1637 and who died in September 1717. She married, second, 4 December 1688, Richard Grosse, who died 11 September 1711, age 68 years.

In 1668 John "Pedricke" signed a petition from Marblehead for the repeal of customs duties (Mass. St. Archives, 60:39a).

One hundred and fourteen householders were listed in Marblehead in 1674. This list included John Pedrick Sr., probably the John "of the Neck," and John Pedrick Jr., probably the John "of the Main." (Samuel Roads, *The History and Traditions of Marblehead*, [Cambridge, 1880] p. 26.)

On 20 December 1678 Christopher Latimore sold to John Pedrick "of the neck" part of eight acres bought of John Goyte by "my father William Pitts." This land located on Marblehead neck was bordered by land that John Pedrick had lately bought of William Browne (Essex County Deeds, hereafter ECD, 5:37). John Codner of Marblehead testified on 16 October 1699 "Some of y<sup>e</sup> Chief proprietors in Marblehead went over to y<sup>e</sup> great Neck at Marblehead (So caled) and then & there Layd out unto John Petherick Sen<sup>r</sup> who was then a liver at Said Neck a parcell of land granted by y<sup>e</sup> Towne of Salem unto John Goit...being Eight acres...adjoining to y<sup>e</sup> land where said John Petherick house stood...this was more Then Twenty years Since..." (ECD 13:161).

John wrote his will on 2 August 1686 and it was presented on 7 October 1686. He named his wife, Miriam; son-in-law John Stacey; son-in-law John Barrett; son-in-law Henry Brentnall; John Searle Jr. and his heirs; eldest son John; and eight other children: Benjamin, Agnes, Mary, Ann, Sarah, Miriam, Elizabeth, and Joanna (Suffolk Co. Probate #1498).

This estate was not completely settled for many years and in the probate file of his son, John, there are divisions of the real estate dated 19 February 1723/4 and 22 July 1727. There are ten shares: a double share to son John Pedrick and one share each to Agnes Stacey, Mary Searle, Ann Barrett, Sarah Brintnall, Miriam Lasher, Elizabeth Bull, Benjamin Pedrick, and Hannah Cook (Essex County Probate, hereafter ECP, #21088).

Miriam is buried on the Old Burial Hill and her stone reads:

In 1803, 1804, and 1805 there were a series of deeds in which the heirs of Joseph and his son, Thomas (who died without issue), sold off their rights in the two estates. These deeds have been of immense help in sorting out the Pedricks of Marblehead. I present here the lists of heirs from four representative deeds: On 8 March 1803 the heirs of Thomas Pedrick, late of Marblehead, merchant, deceased, sold their rights to William Pedrick of Marblehead, shoreman. They were listed as Richard Pedrick, shoreman, with wife Elizabeth; Knott Pedrick, shoreman, with wife Mary; Nicholson Broughton, mariner; Samuel Horton, shoreman, and Eleanor his wife in her right; Joseph Proctor, mariner, and Nancy his wife in her right; Robert Girdler Jr., mariner; Margaret Girdler, spinster; Joseph Girdler, mariner, with wife Rebecca; John Harris, carpenter, and Eleanor his wife in her right; Elisha Story, physician, and Mehitable his wife in her right; John Pedrick Jr., shoreman, with wife Sarah; Thomas Fuller, mariner, and Mary his wife in her right; Benoice Johnson, mariner, and Sarah his wife in her right; Lydia Marr widow; Joseph Pedrick and Ebenezer Pedrick, laborers, all of Marblehead; and Joseph Eaton of Boston, merchant, and Mary his wife in her right. (ECD 209:13)

On 29 January 1805 Thomas Williams as attorney for Nicholson Broughton, John Broughton, Norman Broughton, and Glover Broughton, children and heirs of Nicholson Broughton late of Marblehead, deceased, sold their rights in the estate of Joseph Pedrick, late of Marblehead, deceased. (ECD 175:216)

Johnson, Sally Johnson, Benoice Johnson, Broughton Devereux, Benjamin Pedrick, George Pedrick, and Eleanor, wife of Samuel Chandler, all of Marblehead, minors, sold their part of a lot that had belonged to Joseph Pedrick. 8. WILLIAM<sup>3</sup> PEDRICK (John<sup>2-1</sup>) was baptised 24 April 1709 and was dead by 10 April 1738 when widow, Jane, was named administratrix. He married 28 December 1729, JANE CHAPMAN. She married, second, by 2 October 1752, \_\_\_\_\_ Stevens. She was possibly the daughter of John and Jane (Tucker) Chapman.

On 10 April 1738 Jane, widow, was appointed administratrix to the estate of her husband, William; Joseph Pedrick and Samuel Russell were the sureties. The inventory was taken the same day and included only personal property valued at 116:14:6 pounds. An account dated 2 October 1752 signed by Jane Stevens listed expenses for bringing up a young child for three years and the funerals of two children. (ECP #21113)
